

# Mass Incarceration and the American Trinity By Lowell Noble

Behind slavery, segregation and mass incarceration lies white racism; underlying white racism, stands the American trinity of individualism, materialism and ethnocentrism; behind the American trinity stands a catastrophic theological failure to faithfully and fully teach the large biblical content on oppression and justice. Will the American evangelical church release the power of the Holy Spirit to incarnate the kingdom of God as justice for the poor and oppressed in order to dismantle the unjust system of mass incarceration and destroy the American trinity? Or will the white evangelical church continue to sit on its hands as the American trinity manifested though the mass incarceration of young Black and Hispanic males continues to wreak havoc in Black and Hispanic communities?

I believe that the American trinity [...] is an evil system of values that has generated the system of mass incarceration. Michelle Alexander, the African American lawyer who wrote the ground-breaking book entitled The New Jim Crow, believes that the War on Drugs initiated in 1982 quickly became a case of massive racial profiling. Since 1982, 31 million persons have been arrested for drug offenses; overwhelmingly, they were Black and Hispanic. But studies show that Blacks, Whites, and Hispanics traffic in illegal drugs equally; about 6 percent of each ethnic group use and sell illegal drugs. Use illegal drugs equally, imprisoned unequally.

Alexander believes that white racism is the culprit driving mass incarceration. Racism must be replaced by "an ethic of genuine care, compassion, and concern for every human being--of every class, race and nationality--within our nation's borders (including poor whites)."

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# Forgotten Power

"We may as well face it: the whole level of spirituality among us is low. We have measured ourselves by ourselves until the incentive to seek higher plateaus in the things of the Spirit is all but gone... [We] have imitated the world, sought popular favor, manufactured delights to substitute for the joy of the Lord and produced a cheap and synthetic power to substitute for the power of the Holy Ghost."-A. W. Tozer-

In his wonderful book Forgotten God Francis Chan writes: "From my perspective, the Holy Spirit is tragically neglected and, for all practical purposes, forgotten. While no evangelical would deny His existence, I'm willing to bet there are millions of churchgoers across

America who cannot confidently say they have experienced His presence or action in their lives over the past years. And many of them do not believe they can."

I would have to agree with Pastor Chan. Ours is a church age that has relied too heavily on our own power, preferences, and prerogatives. Though we wouldn't flat out deny the Spirit's existence, many of us don't have the blessed assurance of His presence and power in our daily lives. For others, talk of the Holy Ghost makes them nervous because of emotionalism in churches or Gospel pimps who manipulate spirituality in pulpits and on religious broadcasts. We either live as if the Spirit doesn't matter or have become too frightened to embrace His leadership. Neither position allows us to receive the Holy Spirit's gifts for us.

This sad state of the church may be the reason I've given so much attention to the Holy Spirit in my eleven years of ministry. I remember growing up in the small Missionary Baptist church of my youth, yearning for something more than dead religion. The predictability of our services and the spiritual fruitlessness of many of the members led me to believe that there wasn't really much to religion. We went to church because it was the acceptable thing to do, but changed many of us were not. It wasn't until I sought God beyond mere ritual that I experienced the grace of the Holy Spirit—and I've never been the same since. Only the Spirit can take us deeper, deeper.

June 12 many churches will celebrate Pentecost Sunday, a time when we remember the coming of the promise of the Father and the dynamic power the early church received in order to faithfully bear witness to Jesus the Anointed One (Acts 1-2). The Person and power of the Holy Spirit is so important, so vital to our discipleship and ministry, that I'll be teaching and preaching at length about this subject through the coming weeks. My prayer is that the same Pentecostal power will fill and strengthen us. Do not fear nor be too proud to accept the Spirit's leading. May we pray on one accord this simple prayer, given to us through a great hymn of the church:

Spirit of the living God, fall fresh on me.

Melt me, mold me, fill me, use me.

Spirit of the living God, fall fresh on me. Amen!

Evangelicals don't fully understand the Bible they supposedly treasure; their Bible is full of powerful teaching on oppression and justice which they largely ignore. We evangelicals, with the help of the Holy Spirit and the word of God, should have spotted this new system of oppression, this new racial caste system, before anyone else, but we did not. [...]

By our ignorance, silence and inaction, we remain more a part of the problem than a major

part of the solution. It need not, it should not, be this way. Evangelicals could replace the American trinity with love, justice, reconciliation and shalom. The Spirit-anointed church could become a powerful instrument in the hands of God to incarnate the kingdom of God as justice among the poor and oppressed. We could destroy the false god of the American trinity.



### The Christian Legal Society

The Christian Legal Society (CLS) was founded in 1961 in Chicago, Illinois, by several attorneys through the leadership of Paul Barnard and Harry Brinks. It was incorporated on October 19, 1961. Their initial brochure outlines CLS's main purposes which remain:

- To provide a means of society among Christian lawyers
- To clarify and promote the concept of the Christian lawyer
- To encourage and aid deserving young students in preparing for the legal profession
- To provide a forum for the discussion of problems relating to Christianity and law
- To cooperate with bar associations and other organizations in asserting and maintaining high standards of legal ethics.

Chapters of CLS have been established by most state Bar Associations and accredited law schools throughout the United States. In addition, more than forty states have membership directors. A few of those states have Christian Conciliation directors. The latter operate under the principles of I Corinthians 6:1-11 and Matthew 18: 15-20. These passages are concerned with not only the ultimate resolution of dispute but also means by which resolution is achieved. While conflict among Christians is inevitable, the former Biblical passages outline a Christ-like method for resolving disputes. Conciliation services are provided for members, Christians and non-Christians.

The organization publishes the <u>Quarterly</u>, which features articles that explore topics that relate to religious issues. For example, in the Spring 1991 <u>Quarterly</u>, there appeared the article entitled "Bring Salt in the Legal Profession". Moreover, key events and cases which touch on religious freedom and the First Amendment to the United States Constitution are provided.
